NUS EDUCATION CONFERENCE REPORT

The 2025 NUS Education Conference was held at the Australian National University under the theme "Crisis." Delegates from across the country gathered to engage with the current state of higher education, student activism, and broader political and social issues affecting students.

This was my first time attending EdCon. I went in hopeful that it would be a space for learning, collaboration and campaign development. While there were certainly moments that reflected this purpose, there were also many sessions that fell short due to factionalism or a lack of focus.

Despite that, I found value in attending. The better sessions were well run and showed how much potential the NUS has if it chooses to focus on supporting student unions rather than political factions. I left the conference more confident in the work we do at UWA and hopeful that the NUS can continue to evolve into a more effective national body.

DAY 1

Plenary - Education Office

The opening plenary was intended to set the tone for the conference but quickly became overshadowed by debate about international politics. Important topics were raised, but the discussion did not stay on track and many delegates left with more confusion than clarity.

Shelf Life Expired

This workshop was about universities' complicity in fossil fuel extraction through links to the North West Shelf project. Highlighted the need for divestment and accountability from university leadership. It was well researched and prompted good discussion about how student unions can pressure universities to cut these ties.

Fighting Education Cuts

This workshop addressed ongoing course cuts across the country. Delegates discussed how universities are increasingly operating like businesses and the impact this is having on the student experience. It was helpful to hear from other unions about their responses, although many are still in early stages of organising. UWA hasn't faced this issue in awhile, but it was helpful to know what patterns to look out for.

Divided We Fall, United We Conquer

Focused on building a unified broad-left movement amidst rising global far-right politics. While the concept was strong, the session lacked clear strategic direction. It was difficult to see how the discussion could be applied practically in a campus context.

Plenary - Welfare Office

A discussion of the NUS Welfare Survey and how we can improve national campaigns. It was also interesting to hear that a national survey they put out received less then 100 responses, highlighting the NUS inability to rally engagement and run large campaigns. Information like this would be helpful to student unions if they are done on scale but unfortunately if seems that our surveys receive much more engagement and interest. There was widespread agreement that the NUS needs to focus its efforts on a smaller number of campaigns and deliver them well.

DAY 2

Plenary - What's Wrong with Our Universities?

Rod Lyall, a former UWA Guild Secretary, provided a thoughtful historical reflection on the decline of the higher education system. He drew attention to the increasing commercialisation of universities and how the cost of a degree has risen while quality has declined. This was one of the most grounded and informative plenaries. Interestingly this was probably the only sessions where the was no factional fighting derailing the conversation.

The People's Inquiry into Campus Free Speech on Palestine

This session was highly relevant, especially given the current climate at UWA. Speakers shared experiences of censorship and suppression on campuses when speaking out on Palestine. The session reinforced the importance of student unions defending freedom of expression and academic dissent.

Plenary – Why the West Has Greenlit a Genocide

This plenary presented a critique of the role Western governments have played in enabling the violence in Gaza. Very interesting and important but not very new information.

Crisis Management: Successful Student Union Campaigns

This session was meant to break down why some campaigns succeed while others fail. I was very interested in this as I wanted to see success stories and how they were accomplished, however it was not very organised, unclear what the message was and didn't include any examples of successful student union campaigns.

Kindness Across the Aisle

This was one of the most constructive sessions of the week. Delegates collaborated in small groups to identify shared goals and solutions. The format encouraged respectful discussion and highlighted how much more productive the conference could be if this tone were carried across more sessions.

The Importance of Union Education

This presentation provided an overview of union history and the value of early political engagement. Interesting but nothing extremely applicable.

Our Revolution?: An Analysis of Socialist Alternative

A critical yet open discussion about the structure, tactics, and role of SAlt. While not uncontroversial, it provided insight into the motivations and strategy of one of the NUS' most active factions. This was really just rage bait for the socialists but entertaining regardless.

DAY 3

Plenary – Women's Office: Diversity in Education

Discussed how university courses remain gendered and segregated. Speakers shared insights on how to make STEM and other fields more accessible. A valuable panel discussion

Smash the Manosphere

Examined the rise of misogyny and the far-right online, especially among young men. Important context for understanding campus dynamics and a call to action for student unions to lead on combating this trend. Really interesting with very little factional fighting.

Plenary - The Housing Crisis

Delivered by Jordan van den Lamb about the housing crisis in Australia and the issues with policy. Housing being a very relevant issue I was keen to see what this was about not knowing the embarrassing

amount of factional fighting that was about to occur. The first question that was asked by a member of unity was done in a mocking south African accent which was extremely uncomfortable to watch. Many such insults were thrown around while genuine questions from the audience were met by the socialists saying it was not relevant. Shameful display from all the factions and a waste of time.

Faith, Culture, and Belonging

A panel discussing safe spaces and multicultural inclusion. Good presentation and feedback that was grounded in the experiences of minority groups. Was a reminder to not speak for but instead listen to and uplift the voices . Highlighted the importance of student unions in upholding inclusion and mutual respect.

Why the NDIS Fails Disabled People

Challenged the idea that the NDIS is working. A sharp critique of the system and the role student unions can play in pushing for accessible health and support structures. Like many things in the NUS, interesting but not discussion that if helpful to a Guild's operation.

Societies Pricing Out Society

This was a session that looked at how financial barriers are impacting student involvement in clubs and societies, I was hoping this would be good since it was an extremely relevant topic. The examples shared confirmed that UWA is significantly ahead in terms of access and affordability. Nothing was particular new information and the speaker weirdly kept on asking people who had questions, how much SSAF their union was getting and if it was a lot they would end up dismissing the question with 'oh you should be fine, you have so much money'??

The NUS Should Stand with the CFMEU

Made the case for aligning student unions with the labour movement more directly. This was interesting but once again not relevant to a guild's operation and was just a chance for the factions to debate about their political views

DAY 4

Plenary – The Practice of Leadership and Organising

Delivered by Stephen Donnelly, this was a valuable session in the conference. Introduced the Marshall Ganz framework for community organising. The content was clear, practical, and applicable to our work at UWA. Once again, embarrassing to see how some students treat external speaker, members of SALT were consistently interrupting with heckling and jeering. Unfortunate to see that an interesting talk and speaker were treated with such disrespect.

The Right to Protest is Being Attacked

Explored the crackdown on protest rights post-Gaza encampments. Emphasised the growing repression of dissent on campus. This was very relevant but we have not seen what a successful outcome/campaign looks like in this area

Cut Ties with Trump's America

A political presentation calling for the NUS to oppose Australia's alliance with the US. The argument was ideologically consistent but not particularly relevant to Guild operations.

Graphic Design in Political Communication

A well-delivered and practical session that focused on making political communication more effective. It was a helpful change of pace and offered tangible skills that can be applied to Guild campaigns.

Can the Centre Defeat the Right?

A tactical session debating centrist vs radical approaches to fighting the far-right. Interesting debate on political strategy but most of it was already mentioned in previous workshops

Labor's Climate Crimes

A strong critique of the Labor Government's climate inaction and support for fossil fuels. This sparked a lot of debate that was mostly factional fighting. Once again not particularly relevant to Guild operations.

Final Plenary – Queer Office

Closed the conference with a session on defending trans rights. The session was unfortunately disrupted when a trans speaker was heckled by members of Socialist Alternative. In response, all delegates except for unity and salt (who remained) walked out and continued the discussion in an another room.

KEY TAKEAWAYS

- Most of the time this conference was interesting and the opportunity to network and create relationships was helpful
- It had its moments of yelling and factional fighting, but it was also an opportunity to learn.

 Though it wasn't perfect it does give me hope that there is value in the NUS and what it can do.
- I do think UWA has less to learn from some aspects as we are already ahead of other unions in terms of our service provisions and abilities. 50% SSAF play a very big part in that!

PROJECT UPDATE

Student Experience Committee Working Group

- [from April] Still waiting on UWA working group leads to define the scope of the investigation there was one meeting I missed due to mandatory classes, but this was relayed as the general outcome of that meeting.
- No updates since previous still waiting on UWA staff to narrow down the scope.

Student Reference Group

- Taking on a role within the student reference working group at the request of Emma and Fiona, looking to act as a student communication conduit to the larger committee this working group is a subset of
- Working with Tenille tomorrow to set a new agenda, will see what this is then because it hasn't happened yet.

Exam Results Back

- Brought this to the Student Experience committee, and some positive feedback seemed to be received. Overall, some considerations are that this remains after the moderation process for marks, and after exam results are finalised, in order to avoid logistical concerns raised. Need to review UWA policy at some point as well to compare it to existing possibilities.
- Next SEC is next month so will see then, heard that it is being discussed in other committees too.

Food for cultural holidays

- Product of C+T meeting need to consult Ethnocultural and PAC on what holidays would be good. Trying to provide at Guild outlets food specific to certain cultural holidays so as to allow students to have access to these foods when they might be away from home or culture.
- Meetings so far have been delayed given other commitments rearing up.

Food for fines

Review of Assessment Working Group

A huge meeting for the Guild to attend. We listened too and heard some other presentations from university members about various different adjustments being made to assessment policy.

The Guild then presented our briefing note which included various recommendations that the uni were very receptive too. More updates earlier in the report.

Extraordinary Meeting of the Curriculum Committee

Extraordinary meeting called to discuss and approve the introduction of new professional comprehensive courses at UWA. Also introduced a new Bachelor of Hospitality Management and a Graduate Diploma in Ocean Technology and Engineering.

Student Discpline Framework Review

Second meeting of this committee for the year. Convened to hear about the different changes that may be recommended to the Academic Policy to make it more fair for students, especially with the new Ombudsman. We then received an update on benchmarking academic integrity policies from other universities, but was agreed to wait until the next meeting to receive the comprehensive report.

Then reviewed and discussed the student code of conduct, including students rights and responsibilities and the current behaviour policy at UWA.

Curriculum Framework Working Party

Brief agenda mainly focused on minors at UWA. We received a presentation from Demelza Ireland about the Minor in Women's Health, discussing why the minor has had such success and high enrolment rates and how this can be applied across the university to enhance minors at UWA.

Then received an updated on the review of minors and the next steps in this review.

Student Consultative Committee

Great to attend the second SCC for the year. The meeting agenda consisted of introductions with a new SCC Chair coming in for this meeting, as well as updates from all student leaders. From there core staff on the committee provided an update on their portfolios.

Two main agenda items were consultation around the Student Discipline Framework to give a student perspective as they go through drafting changes to that policy. Additionally got a presentation about the EVA policy and how the rollout of that is going.

The Environment Department handed out cookies at Catalyst café to commend students for using the keep cup library and promote Sustainable Action August. The event was supported in collaboration with UWA Grand Challenges.

Inter-Club Campus Clean Up:

The Inter-Club Campus Clean Up was an incredible success, with 112 students picking up ~225 kg of rubbish in just 45 minutes! We had 30 clubs participate, and feedback from students was fantastic. Keep Australia Beautiful WA audited the clean up, which was very helpful. The clean up was followed by some free pizza at the Tav, which definitely attracted heaps of students. I'm hoping the next Environment Officer takes this initiative on, to continue it as an annual event.

Nature Photography Walk:

The Environment Department, Science Union, Photography Club, SEEC, Co-Exist Perth and Friends of Lake Claremont hosted the annual Nature Photography Walk. We had an incredible turnout, with \sim 100 students attending.

We were very fortunate to have Eva Czslowski, leader of Friends of Lake Claremont speak about the flora and fauna of Lake Claremont and give us a tour of the Friends of Lake Claremont shed. Eva is an amazing environmental advocate, having won the Young Citizen of the Year for Town of Cottesloe, for founding 'Operation Carnaby' which creates artificial breeding hollows for the endangered Carnaby's Cockatoos. We were so fortunate to have her lead the nature walk.

The event ended with a lovely sausage sizzle and picnic. What an epic morning!

UWA: Divest from Fossil Fuels Protest:

Enviro hosted a Fossil Fuel Divestment protest in collaboration with AYCC UWA and Go Beyond Gas. The protest was also endorsed by NUS WA. The protest featured speeches from Victoria from Conservation Council of WA, Ollie, Sophie McNeill MLA and I. It was a great way of raising awareness to UWA that we don't want our money invested in fossil fuel companies. It was also fantastic to see so many members of Guild Council attend and support the protest.

After, we had the opportunity to hear from UWA's Investment Management Fund, Mercer. The crowd was mainly staff members, with about 5 students. Every question that was asked was related to UWA's investment in fossil fuels, not only from students, but also staff.

We were extremely disappointed to hear whilst they claimed to be "sustainable", they were still conversing with Woodside and Santos on future investments, claiming they had a just pathway to net zero. I don't see how extending the North West Shelf gas project to 2070 could possibly be sustainable. This is extremely disappointing.

The Environment Department will continue to strongly advocate for fossil fuel divestment, and plan to work with Go Beyond Gas to achieve this.

Upcoming Events:

Sustainable Transport Skate and Brekkie:

In collaboration with the UWA Rollerblading Club, Enviro will be hosting a skate and breakfast. We ran one last semester and Rollerblading had their best turn out at a morning skate. We are hoping to make it an inclusive, fun environment for beginners to try rollerblading.

Pop-Up Op Shop - Ball Boutique:

Enviro's hosting another Pop-Up Op Shop with Guild Volunteering. This time it is a 'Ball Boutique' and will be open over 2 days for students to grab their ball fit before Science Union and Guild Ball.

Corals Last Stand Film Screening:

The Environment Department is going to be screening the 'Corals Last Stand' documentary about Scott Reef and the impacts of Woodside's North West Shelf Project extension. We are hoping to have a panel of speakers around the impacts of climate change and oil extraction around coral reefs.

Project Update:

Keep Cup Library:

The Keep Cup Library has been very successful over the past month. We have been handing out cookies to promote the initiative, as part of Sustainable Action August.

Containers for Change:

Still waiting to hear back from Containers for Change about implementing a drop off point at Uni Hall. They said they'd contact us at end of July, so just waiting.

UWA's 2030 Sustainability Strategy:

I met with Geraldine from UWA Sustainability committee about the 2030 Sustainability Strategy, which I will be sent a draft to review soon. They have recently completed a waste audit, which I will also review.
