

ELECTION REGULATIONS | Explanation of Major Changes

After the Annual General Election in 2014 the WAEC expressed concern over the current set of Guild Election Regulations and said that they wouldn't be able to enforce those regulations in any subsequent elections that they were asked to run. As a result, the Governance Committee has undertaken a lengthy process to ensure that the Regulations are updated to satisfy the recommendations of the WAEC.

The major concern of the WAEC was the role of the Returning Officer. They felt that the RO should have no responsibility in handing down punishments to candidates, particularly for offenses that don't directly relate to the electoral process (e.g. harassment), as is the case in state and federal elections. As a result, the WAEC also recommended abolishing provisions for an Election Tribunal and Election Committee, as their powers are void in the light of the changing role of the RO. The past responsibility of the RO to check the content of Election Material for truthfulness and accuracy was considered to be in contradiction with a High Court case that ruled that misinformation is allowed to be permitted on Election Material, as it's the role of the voter to determine what they believe or not, provided it isn't printed on a How to Vote card. Essentially, the WAEC recommended that the group that runs the election is only responsible for the administration of the election itself, and doesn't get involved in discipline procedures.

To ensure the integrity of the election and the Guild are upheld, the Governance Committee drafted a Code of Conduct, to be signed by all candidates when nominating. This code covers misconducts previously dealt with by the RO, such as discriminatory behavior, defamation, and harassment, and is enforceable by the UWA Board of Discipline, as most of these misconducts are also in breach of the Charter of Student Rights and Responsibilities. In addition, there is an added level of responsibility for Group Agents over the Election Material created and distributed by their candidates, to prevent defamatory material from being circulated during elections. Under these regulations all material will have to be costed, and will be restricted by the printing cap, but there will be no limitations on content. This essentially creates two separate avenues for dealing with misconduct, as demonstrated by the diagrams below.



In order to have more flexibility in elections we have also edited the sections on Postal Votes and Referenda. There are now provisions for any students to apply for a postal vote, similar to how it's done in most other elections, and allowances for referenda to be held at a different time to the Annual General Election.

ELECTION REGULATIONS | Process and Consultation

In undertaking the process of editing these regulations we had a strong focus on consultation. We met with the WAEC to discuss their concerns and recommendations, and in the last meeting had positive feedback about the new Regulations that have been drafted. We also consulted with the University Secretary Deidre D'Souza and Sue Smurthwaite, of Academic Policy Services, about passing the Regulations through the University Senate, and the process involved with the Senate Legislative Committee. UWA Legal provided their advice on some of the legal aspects of the regulations and we engaged a team of lawyers from Jackson McDonald to go over the drafting of the document, ensure that it's legally enforceable, shorten it down to as concise a document as possible. The proposed changes to the Election Regulations come from consolation with all these groups and, as a result, we are confident in the finalized document we have created.

Commercial Tenant Selection Procedure

In Corporate Services, we have been discussing the writing of a 'Tenancy Policy' for business tenants in the Guild Village area. To begin with, we had no formalised internal procedure for picking tenants, or process for deciding which types of outlets/services would be present. Nicola and Chloe K have worked to create what was originally called a Tenancy Policy, however due to the fact that a) this policy refers to business tenant (not to be confused with tenants in Cameron Hall); and b) this document isn't an entire policy regarding commercial tenants, more of a 'Part 1'. Hence we have renamed the document to the Commercial Tenant Selection Procedure. There are still discussions about whether to include an actual internal procedure (i.e. the steps to take when selecting a tenant) as well as how the Guild 'approaches' potential tenants.

Corporate Governance Training

In order to adhere to our Service Learning Agreement with the University, where Tony must report its status in early June, Jenny and I met with Clint Vawser to discuss the implementation of a more in-depth corporate governance training session, which is necessary for all members of Guild Council to complete. Clint has run these sessions with Curtin Guild and will be presenting before the May Guild Council Meeting. His background also boasts courses on strategic planning & personal productivity and performance.

UWA Albany Discussion

Lizzy and I met with Katie McAllister (Guild Albany Campus Representative) to discuss Lizzy's recent trip to the UWA Albany Campus, to plan this weekend's Albany Trip and to plan for the rest of the year. A few of the things we discussed are below:

Ed Council | Satellite campuses

We've recently attended the OCHWA and Nedlands campuses to give out Guild stickers, diaries etc. Looking to continue this as it's been well received.

Ed Council | Incidental Feeds and Charges

I've been made aware of an issue in a marketing unit where students were required to purchase software in order to complete a number of assessments. This is a clear violation of University Policy, a fact I have confirmed with Academic Policy Services, and I'll be pushing for a full refund for all students who did purchase the software as well as ensuring this doesn't occur in the future.

Ed Council | IT:

The plan for the five key areas being upgraded is progressing nicely and should be done by the start of Semester 2, no guarantees though.

The issue of Med students having WIFI access in hospitals is progressing slowly. WIFI access has been guaranteed in the new Perth Children's Hospital for Med Students, however knowing the logistics and likelihood of providing WIFI to the other hospitals relies on an upcoming meeting between UWA IT and the Health Department that hasn't been scheduled. It's not a top priority for the Health Department in the context of everything else going on and is moving slowly.

Ed Council | Unit Readers

Mel Lee is working on a report about the issues that have been created with the university transitioning from printing unit readers en masse. It's clear that students still prefer physical readings so we're wanting to create a scenario in the near future where students can easily print off all their readings and have more technical support for digital readings.

Ed Council | Academic Question

The question on the Guild website relating to support required for students in the transition from LMS to Blackboard provided very little information as to what support students want, but it did make it clear that most students didn't know the transition was taking place. An issue I've raised with Lisa Cluett and Gilly Salmon.

The more recent question regarding student preferences for readings had a good response and has been useful.

At present there's a question related to student preferences for the method of class allocations.

Ed Council | Late Assesments

The late assessment return form continues to be more popular than I had expected. It's good that we're dealing with issues we hadn't previously, but concerning about how often assessments are returned late!

Ed Futures | Blackboard:

The transition to Blackboard draws ever nearer. Students have been invited to attend testing of the new LMS interface under Blackboard on the 21st May.

Student Consultative Committee:

Discussions at the April SCC:

Gilly Salmon reported back on the progress with Blackboard.

Stephen Tefrey is working around issues with UNIFI remembering passwords.

Grady discussed issues around ghost writing services being advertised around campus. It was noted that advertising support services is crucial when students are struggling.

The issues with printing page reversals have been narrowed down the Adope PDFs on webprint and are still being worked on.

There was a discussion about ensuring the Senate resolution relating to Prosh is properly enforced next year.

EAN | Fee Dereg

The Federal Govt has signalled they're still keen for fee deregulation. Naturally we'll keep a close eye on any attempts to reintroduce the legislation and respond appropriately.

Introduction:

A lot of PAC's energy this month has been directed to Social Justice Week and planning for future events.

Finance | Budget

The total amount budgeted for May in the Budget was \$200. However, this does not take in to account money that was budgeted for Social Justice Week earlier in the year. At the point of writing this report, the total expenditure for Social Justice Week was \$477. I expect additional hire costs of approximately \$200 to come through, leaving us under budget for Social Justice Week.

Finance | PAC Collaborative Grants

Clubs have been distributed with the PAC Collaborative Grants form. PAC clubs that are running collaborative events may apply for \$250, \$500 or \$1000 grant to cover the cost of their event. Applications are due 29th of May.

Our winning clubs have received their \$100 and \$50 prizes through direct deposit.

Social Justice Week | Events

Social Justice Week was a huge success this year, and a huge congratulations is made to PAC Vice-President Eloise Chenu and Social Justice Collaboration Chair Maya Shah. Week 10 had events on Monday through Thursday, including a main Social Justice Carnival at ALVA on Tuesday. Monday night's Teach for Australia Quiz Night was incredibly successful, with over 70 attendees.

Tuesday night's Asylum Seeker Panel Discussion hosted by Oxfam UWA was also incredibly popular, with a full house at Austin Lecture Theatre. During the day, our stall at ALVA included a Guild information table, a FABSOC ethical beauty stand, PAW's signature 'cruelty-free' barbecue and a friendship bracelet stall operated by the PAC committee.

Our Oak Lawn Social Justice Club Carnival saw keen involvement from both clubs and students alike. We saw stalls from Oaktree UWA, Amnesty UWA, Save the Children, Students for Refugees, Uni Camp for Kids, Guild Volunteering, WASAC and the PAC Committee.

Wednesday night's screening of *Samson and Delilah* had a poor turn out, however Amnesty International UWA were not deterred and will continue to get involved with the collaboration in the future. The Fabsoc, SJC and Oxfam Fairtrade Fashion Fest was an extremely successful night, and it was great to see such a unique event being run on campus to finish off Social Justice Week. This event featured a number of ethical, fairtrade products for sale along with free fairtrade tea and coffee. The highlight of the night was the fair-trade fashion runway show, which was extremely professional and entertaining. It was great to see such a high calibre of event run that night, as well as throughout the entirety of the week and all those involved should be incredibly proud.

Social Justice Week | Fundraising

Throughout the week, the Social Justice Collaboration was raising funds to assist those people that have been affected by the recent earthquakes in Nepal. We are working alongside students from Nepal in

deciding which of the relevant charities these funds should be directed towards. At the moment, the current count is looking to be approximately \$1000. We have money collection tins at guild catering outlets.

Fringe Festival | Planning

We are currently working with the events team. There has been a big focus on our advertising and marketing campaign, as well as developing a well organised budget and financial plan for the Fringe Festival.

Student Musicians | Events

PAC has been collaborating with the Events team to organise student artists to perform at End of Semester Show and Guild events in the future. A number of student musicians have expressed an interest in performing, so we are attempting to fit them in to existing performance schedules.

Equity & Diversity Committee | Meetings

Our focus for the last Equity and Diversity Committee has been building on the progress of our E&D Guidelines for clubs. We also have a focus on increasing representation for students with disabilities through working with UniAccess. We also have co-opted Rida Malik Welfare Officer and Laura Mwiguara on to the committee.

Hi,

In May thus far, we had our second Connect back at the University Club. It was a success and we also managed to raise 140\$ for victim of the Nepal earthquake which will be directed to a charity run by a Nepali postgraduate student at UWA. After discussions broadly, it has been decided that due to space constraints at the University Club, future Connect's will be held at the UWA Watersports Leadership Centre as this will allow us to serve more postgrads and offer more food and drink for a longer period of time. The Quiz night will be held next week and so far it looks like it will be a sold out event. Sponsorship for gifts and prizes have come in from a variety of sources and we are offering roughly 800\$ worth of prizes during the night.

On the campaigns front, our campaign for the university to reject the Lomborg Consensus Centre was successful with the VC announcing that the university cannot, in good faith, accept the proposal for the centre due to strong opposition within the staff and student body. Additionally, our campaign for the university to reverse planned cuts to HDR Completion Scholarships has received some traction being mentioned in the Campus Morning Mail and Higher Ed High Wire on the Australian. PSA reps have met with Robyn Owens and Alan Dench on the matter but no clear resolution was found as such we are continuing the social media campaign against the cuts and I have put forward a motion on the matter to Academic Council to discuss. Further resolution on the question will be reported to Guild Council.

In May, the first round of PSA Conference Travel, Fieldwork and Small Grants applications were evaluated by the Scholarship Subcommittee of the PSA. Out of 36 applicants, 12 were successful, winning 10900\$ worth of grants for Conference Travel, Fieldwork and for organising research related events on campus.

Welfare & Advocacy Committee | Summary

- If you would like to volunteer during EOSS please send me an email, I'd be very appreciative.


Albany Engagement Program

HILTON

I met with Mai Rodthong the Events Manager at Hilton the week before the SOC Meeting. I told her what the Guild is and did my best to explain how SOC works. After my long-winded explanation, she was very excited and keen to get on board and to help clubs out. So, Hilton has agreed to provide UWA Guild affiliated clubs with an AMAZING discount!

If the booking is on a night from Sunday to Thursday the venue cost will be \$85 per person a discount of \$25 per person! If the booking is on either Friday or Saturday the venue cost will be \$95 per person (discount of \$20 per person!)

These packages include:

- > 3 course menu or buffet
- > 5 Hour standard drinks package
- > Stage and dance floor
- Coloured linen

Another notable plus is that Hilton is very accommodating for club event organisers. They understand that these event organisers are student volunteers and they want to work very closely with the club to ensure their event is a success.

The day after the meeting, I again spoke to Mai and she told me that already 3 clubs were interested in holding their ball at Hilton. I foresee this being a beautiful and mutually beneficial relationship!

UNIPRINT

I mentioned at last Guild Council that the printing procedure is going to change. Currently it is very easy for clubs to overdraw their accounts as UniPrint charges the club at the end of the month. To ensure that Finance is kept happy and they don't have to deal with overdrawn accounts, UniPrint will open up an independent 'club account'. The club account will be topped up from Guild Finance and essentially the club is immediately paying for future printing expenses. Once this credit runs out at UniPrint, the club will be required to again top it up,

by transferring funds from their UniPrint account.

NEW CLUB DASHBOARD

The new club dashboard is done! (OH HAPPY DAYS!)

Over this week, Clubs have slowly been getting access to the new Club Management System (CMS). At the next SOC Meeting I plan to go through CMS and the Clubs Website to ensure that clubs know where they can find information, and how to navigate around the various websites and back-systems.

ONLINE BANKING

Myself, Westpac and Guild Finance has worked together to put together an Online Banking Form. This form has been sent out to 5 clubs and once they are returned, the 5 clubs will migrate to Online Banking! Over time, we will start to add more and more clubs and see the beginning of a new era for club banking <3

This migration also means that we will need to conduct treasurer training again or compile a handbook to ensure clubs know how to bank online with Westpac

CLUBS WEBSITE

It has become evident over the past few weeks that there is still a lot of fixing to be done with the clubs website. I have found that a lot of the online forms were being a pain in the butt and as a result, I have sent my dear Kelvin many emails, asking him to fix them.

The SOC Committee will be conducting a review of the clubs website over the holidays.

Catering and Tavern Committee:

Once again we are having issues with Catering and Tavern attendance. As all the members have had the calendar reminder sent to them for each meeting for the year in advance, I may begin to start cracking down on apologies and absenteeism.

Some developments from the previous month regarding C&T include:

- The issues with supply orders at the Ref Coffee Stop has been fixed
- The soymilk has changed! Yay!
- The soupspoons are being changed as a few OB's reported that they are too sharp to use
- New policy is being developed to train staff into remembering to offer dine in
- Reid Café has extended its opening hours!
- The Welfare Meal is also going quite well in regards to its sale. Obviously, it will be worth looking into promoting this more so that the students it is truly targeted at get to reap the benefits.

Chelsea is heading the marketing strategies for all the cafes to streamline all the information that is broadcast. The plans for winter and the rest of semester in promoting items that we sell that are winter-popular is very well organised and I believe we will have positive results!

Open Day Planning:

Freyja and I are attending the Open Day Planning meetings on behalf of the Guild. We are trying to push for a greater amount of clubs able to attend the day, as well as the use of Faculty Societies by each Faculty, so that there are no understaffing issues. Slowly but surely the planning is coming along, and hopefully Oak Lawn will be featured as a major part of the Open Day Tour, with the Guild having a strong presence there.

Misc. Business:

EOSS looks like it will be a great event – and the crafternoons in the lead up to it have helped me discover that I have more talent with Stanley knives and cardboard than I do with paint! Regardless – everyone should come along to EOSS!

CAMPAIGNS | Gender Pay Gap

This year's Gender Pay Gap campaign went fantastically. We started off with a movie screening of the film 'Made in Dagenham' on Monday night, which follows the story of working class women in the 1960s that fought for equal pay. We had a successful turn out and overall it was a fantastic event. On Tuesday we had a stall to raise awareness about the gender pay gap, and sold cup cakes at varied prices to reflect the pay gap for different marginalized groups. It was fantastic to have so many women bake for the sale, and the cupcakes managed to sell out well before the end of common lunch hour and were an excellent method of engaging with passing students.

We also ran a very successful online campaign, sharing statistics and information on the gender pay gap and how to combat it. The Women's Department Facebook page got around 100 news likes over the week and the Facebook event reached 20,000 people. The informative posters on the gender pay gap have been put up around campus, to ensure that we have a wide reach and people remain engaged in the issue beyond the end of the week.

EVENTS | Welfare Week Collaboration

For the Welfare Department's Welfare week the Women's Department had a stall on Wednesday about women's health, with an emphasis on sexual health, and on the Thursday we collaborated with FabSoc to have a FABwall for everyone to express 'what makes them feel fab' and stress the importance of self esteem and positivity.

COLLECTIVES | Women's Collective

The Women's Collective meetings have gone really well this semester. I have been sharing the 'running' of the meetings with other women in the Collective to allow them to take on responsibility and leadership. The themed topics have also been successful in engaging more women in the meetings and having more interesting discussions.
