COMMITEES | Corporate Services Committee

I am the member of Executive that is responsible for Corporate Services Committee, and its Chair. At the time of writing this report the committee has not met for the month, but here is a progress summary of Committee projects:

POS

After the approval of TASK as our new POS system by Council last meeting, we have created a TASK Implementation working group. This group will oversee the general implementation of TASK across our outlets, as well as the integration of NetSuite during this process. The group will be reporting back to the Corporate Services Committee, and will work closely with Kelvin. TASK have offered extensive support during this period, and will provide personnel to aid with the process.

Additionally, the TASK's system will be hosted on a physical in-house server. This recommendation was put forth by the Corporate Services committee as it is the most cost efficient method, and meets all of the requirements of the system.

Servers and emails

As was indicated by the recent outage of our Guild server, the situation is becoming a bit dire and requires almost immediate action. The current consideration for the committee is the decision between a physical Guild server versus a 'Cloud'-type one. This will be a large focus of our next committee meeting, with a recommendation being put to SRC.

Cleaning tender

Our new cleaning service providers will be commencing on May 2nd. All of the unsuccessful bidders have been informed, and the contract and terms of agreement have been secured with our new cleaners. If individuals have any feeback during the initial months of the new arrangement, please pass it on to me, so it can then be fed back to the new cleaners. Understandably, there may be a few kinks due to our large facilities, however it is expected that the overall standard of cleaning will be higher than what has been evident lately.

Guild Car

The usage of the Guild car is another issue that will be address at the upcoming meeting.

Second-hand Bookshop

The working group tasked with reviewing the second-hand bookshop will be preparing a report for CSC, to be referred on to relevant groups and committees. This report will contain recommendations for the future of the space, considerations of potential growth, analyses of trends and benchmarks comparing with other campuses across the country and other recommendations. UNIVERSITY | Parking & Security

Parking & Security Update

As outlined in the Guild regulations, it is the responsibility of the Vice President to lobby the university on parking, security and transport related issues. I am securing quarterly meetings with the Associate Director Facilities Operations (Campus Management) George Anderson and Manager Campus Services (Campus Management) Garry Jones. These meetings will be an opportunity to raise any issues and provide a student's perspective on parking and security issues on campus. If anybody has anything that needs to be raised at these meetings, please talk to either myself or Maddie.

• Welcome Back Lunch at the Tav

This week MASA had it's very first event for the semester and it was an absolute success. We had over 70 people respond to the invite for our Welcome Back Lunch in the Tav, in addition to a number of students who came on the day without registering. It was a fantastic opportunity for students to meet other mature age students, and the feedback I received from attendees was overwhelmingly positive. A big thank you to Hayden and his team for being so accommodating, and congratulations to the MASA committee for organising this event. Personally, I had a great time and it was a fantastic opportunity to hear some of the opinions and perspectives of learned mature age students on the happenings on campus. I also found it rewarding to hear about the diversity of course and major choices of the students, and it reminded me that the MASA community are an extremely diverse one.

AGM

The MASA committee is going to have its Annual General Meeting on the 12th April from 1-2pm. At the meeting there will be free lunch provided for attendees. We really pushed attendance at the AGM to people at our Lunch, as it has been decided by the committee that there is no way that we can continue to run frequent and successful events without the contributions of more MASA students. At this AGM, we will be seeking expressions of interests for committee positions, emphasising that contributions don't need to be particularly time consuming – every little bit counts!

Organising meetings

The collective is well and truly off the ground, having had 3 organising meetings this year. As of our last one, we have Co-Presidents Cara O'Sullivan and Graham Knapp, who will be leading a committee of around 10 students in furthering the group. The priorities for the collective at this stage are the creation of rules and guidelines, promotion to more students, working with UniAccess to promote their services, outreach to external organisations with resources, obtaining grants and funding for the group and organising social events for members of the collective. I have been blown away with the passion and enthusiasm of everybody involved, and am feeling very excited about the group and its ability to make a difference in the University lives of students in this community.

The Collective was present at Club Carnival, and had a few more sign ups. I believe these sorts of presences are essential for the collective, and we hope to have more everyday stall sign ups and promotional opportunities.

DEPARTMENTS | Albany

The Albany Student Association committee is beginning to find its feet for the year. They will be having their elections soon. They have a number of events coming up, and are engaging with a number of community groups. Firstly, they will be having an Easter Barbecue. The barbecue will be a family friendly event with committee drinks after. At the event they will be hosting a raffle to raise money for future events. The committee and some students are also volunteering at local events.

A challenge for the committee so far this year has been accessing finance and financial services of the Guild. In the interim we have established a basic procedure for purchasing materials, such as a barbecue for their Easter event. I am in close conversation with the group in assisting them in their endeavours on this front. They have also been working closely with Maddie and Lucy for the formalization of their rules.

GUILD ALUMNI | Event Planning

As a long-term strategy of the Guild, the development of a Guild Council Alumni group is on the radar. We will be having an event for young alumni on the 21st April. This event will be based in the CCZ and will involve a tour of the new facilities and south wing offices, followed by casual drinks and a presentation. Young Alumni from 2008 onwards (specifically, those involved in the Masterplan project) will be invited to attend, alongside the current Guild council.

GUILD ALUMNI | Strategy

As part of the broader strategy, there have been a number of steps/stages that have been devised, lead by Associate Director Student Services. For the moment, a LinkedIn Group specifically for Guild Council alumni has been created, with regular content scheduled to be posted. This will provide a networking opportunity for alumni, and a an avenue for the Guild to stay in touch with past members of Guild council. This project is being undertaken with the close help of Melissa, the Guild's archivist.

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INTRODUCTON

Since the last Council Meeting the Societies Council has had a very busy time with Treasurer Training, Club Carnival and the Presidents' Summit. Despite illness hitting both myself and my VP, I am proud to report that the rest of the committee took up the reins and it has been a successful month.

I am keen to hear the Councils input on the Campus Quest Project, which although was unable to be run this semester would be a great way to show new students around campus. In particular:

- What are the important places on campus to know?
- What will get people to visit locations? That is what type of reward system or benefit should we offer?
- Is it worth while running it at the start of semester two?

ADMINISTRATION

I have noticed a marked increase in email inquiries this past month, I expect this is due to the fact the Semester has started and therefore club work has also increased pace. However the fundamental aspects of club administration are as follows:

New Club Affiliations

At the last SOC meeting the following clubs have been successfully affiliated:

- Hip Hop Listening Club (HHLC)
- Cheerleading Society of UWA (CSU)
- South African Society of WA (SASWA)
- Women in Oil and Gas (WIOG)
- Australasian Intervaristy Debating Championships (WAustrals)

These clubs were unsuccessful in affiliation:

- > UWA League Club (ULC)
- Reframe

This means that the Guild has 120 Active clubs and societies and 16 Lapsed & 6 New/Pending clubs.

Currently I have received interest from the following clubs to go up for affiliation at the next SOC Meeting:

Masters of Social Work

* Re-Affiliations/Lapsed Clubs

I have had interest to restart these Lapsed clubs:

University Linguistics Club

The Language Club

Executive Registration Forms

There are currently 14 clubs with out up to date ERFs and 2 clubs without any registered with the Guild. I have been in contact with all the active clubs, with the rest to Lapsed.

Constitutions

There are currently 13 clubs and 6 faculty societies without a registered constitution, although some of those are awaiting approval or resubmission. Unfortunately, as Sean



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has been sick we have not been able to follow these up, however once he returns to better health we shall pursue these. There is also likely going to be a change to club constitutions with the change of the incorporations act beginning on May the 1st.

Incorporation

Again as Sean has been away there has been little movement on the goals I outlined in my past report. However I have secured a list of clubs who know they are incorporated at the Presidents' Summit, where Tony presented on incorporation and ensured clubs understand the process.

O-Day Grants

As of writing this report the O-Day Grants have been approved by Tom and will be distributed amongst clubs. The grant will distribute \$15,000 to the 71 clubs who applied (special shout out to UEC, Blackstone and HSS who also applied as Faculty Societies), with all clubs receiving a base amount of \$125 plus an additional bonus depending on membership sign ups. In this case the range is from \$133 for the smallest club to \$408 for the largest club.

Special Project Grants

This year we had over 17 applications for the \$2500 grant pool, which was quite competitive with some great initiatives by clubs and societies on campus. The allocation has been approved by Executive and will be distributed over the next week or so. We ended up funding 7 of the applications with a range of \$60 through to \$680.

Treasurer Training

Over the last few weeks I have been running the four Treasurer Training sessions for all club and society treasurers. The dates were as follows:

- ➤ 10th March
- ➤ 14th March
- > 17th March
- ≥ 22nd March

I can report that 80 clubs have been marked as attending with 3 faculty societies also sending their delegates. Unfortunately the 17th of March and 22nd of March sessions had some venue difficulty which led to some not being able to attend on the day, so for these remaining clubs who have not attended I will be running an additional two sessions, dates to be decided by availability of those treasurers wanting to sign up.

Regretfully the SOC Treasurer has not been able to run Treasurer Training sessions. However, the SOC IPP Nevin has made himself available to help explain his budget template which will be a massive boon to clubs in managing their club finance. The sponsorship template was also very well received.

Finally I must thank Fiona from Guild Finance for being coming and presenting at these sessions, her input was invaluable.

Secretary Training

This has been completed and will be sent out to all clubs over the next fortnight, as well as presented at the next SOC meeting.

PRESIDENTS SUMMIT

On the 16th of March we had all the club presidents converge in Science Cafe for a meeting focusing on committee management. It was well attended with 97 clubs being marked as attending or with apologies. We covered a lot of relevant information for presidents:

- > Incorporation: what it is and what it means for the committee/club
- > Student Assist: what we offer and where club presidents can find it, for themselves or for committee/members
- > Student Leadership Training: the next session and its importance
- A particularly useful presentation by Claire Duffy, who told Presidents how to recruit volunteers; how to keep them motivated; how to manage and create meaningful committee roles; and, finally how to resolve or deal with issues. I would like to thank Claire for her time in preparing the speech given how busy she is currently at Guild Volunteering.

Other than that I can report back that many clubs were very excited by the Wednesday night deal at the Tavern for club members and I expect the Tavern to be packed on these nights.

With O-Day grant data and questions at the President Summit, I am very pleased to announce that this year's O-Day was massive! Only two clubs at the President Summit reported having equal or less members sign-up than last year, with the rest growing their membership base. On top of this, I can report that over 9,082 students were signed up as club members, corresponding to over 8,431 Guild members. Whilst this number reflects the number of memberships not the number of individual students, this is still huge and reflects the hard work of the Events Department and all the other people involved.

If you include the figures from the faculty societies then the figure grows to 9409 and 8731 respectively. My recommendation for next year would be that the Education

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Council also requires Faculty Societies submit membership information so we can better judge the turn out.

Finally I will be putting an end of semester survey to all clubs and societies, which will include O-Day. I have also debriefed with Events and my committee so we can build on this for next year.

Club Carnival

I must give my utmost thanks and admiration to the SOC Secretary Beth who single-handedly ensured Club Carnival ran very smoothly. I fell quite ill over the days leading up to Club Carnival, however Beth was able to organise the tables and site plan as well as run the operations on the day in such a way that I was not even required on the day. We had a 92 registrations in total, however some clubs did not show up for whatever reason.

Something we could have improved was the communication with clubs and Guild departments, as we sent details about set-up later than what we were planning. I have made a note of this for next semester.

❖ PROSH

The wonderful PROSH Directors Matt and Emilie came and promoted the annual event at the Presidents' Summit and have been emailing the clubs reminding them to join. I will also be reminding clubs and pushing them to join with all of my correspondence.

Mini-Club Carnival a.k.a. "Club Carnival: Business Edition"

Clubs have been quite keen to have additional club carnivals, as they allow easy promotion of their club and for promoting ticket sales. As such the first additional club carnival for the year will be held at the Business School in week 6, which will allow a lot of clubs to promote their end of semester events. We have been selective inviting only the business and international clubs due to the limited space and a focus by the Business School on international relations. We hope it will be a big success and I will be reporting back at the next Council meeting.



The Women's Department had a phenomenal O Day, with many thanks due to the brilliant helpers from the Women's Collective throughout the day. The goodie bags that we filled with a copy of the '2016 Women's Department Pocket Guide', contraception, sanitary products, pamphlets for health and support services, that we gave to students when they signed up to the mailing list were all distributed by early afternoon. This was to our pleasant surprise, we'll look to be more ambitious in the future! We continued to give away resources and materials throughout the afternoon. The stall also distributed flyers for the final Movies on Oak screening of 'Spirited Away' to mark International Women's Day, hoping that those who visited the stall would attend as a first opportunity to touch base with the Department.

The most outstanding success of the day was the signing up of well over 100 students to the Department mailing list. We hope to keep in touch with these students throughout the year and to utilise the mailing list as a method to engage more students.

EVENTS I CLUB CARNIVAL

I was overseas overseas for Club Carnival, leaving it in the very capable hands of the Department VPs and members of the Collective. I believe the afternoon went well, though perhaps not as well as O Day. We still signed up a number of students to the mailing list and gave away resources.

EVENTS I MOVIES ON OAK / IWD

Following Club Carnival, the Guild screened the final film of the Movies on Oak series. As mentioned, the Women's Department promoted the screening in order to commemorate IWD. Members of the Women's Collective went down prior to the screening to promote the Department and introduce themselves to those in attendance.

The University hosted an International Women's Day morning tea on the morning of the 8th, though disappointingly, did not engage with the Women's Department.

ENGAGEMENT I COLLEGES

On February 28th, the St Catherine's College Resident's Council ran an after dark campus walking tour for its residents. attended by Women's Collective members. The tour utilised the 'Safe on Campus: UWA at Night Map and Information' compiled by the Guild in 2015.

4. Collaborative Events

4.1. Pride Week Party

The Queer Department has received an opportunity to collaborate with the Music Students' Society and Leisure for a party and the end of Pride Week in Semester 2. We are still in the planning stages of this event.

4.2. Blackstone Society Collaboration

For the first year ever, Blackstone Society has appointed a Queer Officer, and we have been discussing possible collaboration ideas with him. Options that have been suggested are a movie night, Blackstone Society providing assistance in finding panellists for a panel discussion run by the Queer Department, and promoting each others' LGBT+ related events on Facebook.

INTERFACULTY SPORTS

The past three rounds of interfaculty sports has seen an average turnout in competitors and supporters. The sports included squash, paddling and tennis. The average turnout would be due to the fact that these sports only cater for two-three competitors per team. The next round will womens netball which we are expecting a solid turnout from all faculty societies.

Hello everyone,

Committee business

The PSA committee were incredibly helpful in running and organising the orientation events. Our Science, Arts and Engineering representatives were all invited to talk with students during their faculty specific orientation events. I also attended Arts and Science as well as welcomed postgraduate students during the postgraduate commencement ceremony.

In regards to the postgraduate innovation event that was discussed with the engagement committee I have spoken to the graduate education officers as well as Anthony Fortina from the innovation office and we have agreed on a slight change of tact. The suggested event that we have planned is for students to submit a 30second video introducing them and their research. The top students will then be invited to give a talk to invited guests based on these talks to that certain areas can be targeted. Ideally convocation will be utilized by providing these linkages and also helping judge the videos. The videos made by the students and the 5minute videos made during research week will then be hosted on the universities website and also linked to appropriate industry partners. Given the proposed changes to UniView it might also provide an opportunity to have a section on the online version advertising these students.

The Committee is also looking at running a survey this year asking what the postgraduate students want from their organisation. This has not been done in recent memory and in particular will hopefully get a better idea of the services required by our increasing coursework cohort.

Representation

The student assist attendance at the last connect was a huge success. Many students approached me after the talk given by assist telling me that there is a vast collection of services that student assist provided that they were not aware of. The ongoing work between the PSA and Student Assist looks to be useful for all postgraduates and they will be invited at the mid-year connect also. Due to the success of these talks and their informal nature I will be inviting other people to join connect on a regular basis to provide information to students in this manner.

I met with the postgraduate representative of St Catherine's college who is very keen for some joint events in particular talks that can be co-hosted by St Cat's and the PSA. Last month Nikki Man, the PSA VP of Research attended a dinner hosted by St Cat's and I have been invited to attend the next. If all goes according to plan this will provide a framework for further collaborations between the PSA and all of the residential colleges.

I finally I have spent the last 2 months working alongside the Guild and the NTEU in relation to the renewal project. This has included a submission to the Renewal project by the PSA based on feedback from student representatives and individuals that provided feedback to the PSA and the Guild FAQ page.

I have attended the Universities Australia conference which provided some unique opportunities to talk with my national counterparts as well as get an idea of what is coming in the higher education sector in the near future. In particular I found talking with the Chancellor of Western Sydney University particularly illuminating in regards to differing opinions in regards to university board makeups. Not surprisingly many of the talks were focused on the industry engagement plan for the nation and the future of research PhDs. There is expected to be a report from ACOLA by the end of the month in regards to changes in research training.

Thanks to Maddie I have also been able to join the working party for student concerns in regards to changes in the academic calendar. I have also begun formulating a plan to extend journal access for research students past when they submit their thesis so that these students still have access to the resources they need to publish.

Events

Orientation

Orientation was a big success with the exception of engineering. As with all events of this type the numbers are not always huge but the students that come engage with the PSA representatives and more importantly engage with the others of their cohort. We have ideas for improving this initiative for semester 2 and 2017 that includes working more closely with the faculty orientation staff for each school as well as trying to get an updated mailing list earlier than was possible this year.

Date my degree (wine & cheese night) UPDATE DURING MEETING

Our first ever Date My Degree night is scheduled for the 23rd of March. This event will be a form of speed friending where participants will rotate around the room and have to explain and promote what it is they study in 1 minute. This event is in aid of getting students to think more about how

they explain their research and work and are able to advertise themselves in an informal one on one manner. A reward for participating will be a wine and cheese tasting night.

Stargazing

The stargazing night is set for the 3rd of April. This event takes 40 students up to the Perth observatory for a guided tour of the observatory as well as a night of stargazing. This has been a widely popular event in the past 3 years particularly amongst our international students. The 3rd is a dark sky night so it should be a good night for this event.

Finances

Finances for the PSA are slightly higher than expected. The first connect of the semester is generally attended in greater numbers than the rest of the year and that was catered for. The cost to book the water sports complex went from \$180 per connect to \$300 per connect however John gave us a 30% discount so it is only costing us \$240. This has been paid for (\$2640) for the rest of the year which makes up the largest spending from the PSA.

I am still trying to get the Convocation Postgraduate Travel Award money to convocation which should come out by the time of this meeting (\$6000).

The PSA has also been approached with sponsorship offers from a few sources that we are now looking into and will comment further when more information is available.

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Overview

There are only 2 weeks until PROSH by the time Guild Council sits next week!

Writer's nights have been productive with lots of ideas created for articles and photo-shops. Broadway Pizza sponsored each of the nights, reducing the cost significantly to just some additional food and soft drinks. We have been working with Guild Events and Creative to plan for layout weekend, and will be utilising the new Club Collaborative Zone.

Our marketing plan will begin after the Easter long weekend. Posters will be circulated over the long weekend, and there will be 3 guild weekly entries before PROSH Day. We are having an afternoon of painting banners on Tuesday 29th March, which will then go up around UWA and surrounding areas. Lecture bashing has been scheduled and approved for the week of 4th April. UWA Comms is helping us put together a time lapse video of Layout weekend that we'll use for promotional purposes, and we have arranged two 'Instagram Takeover's' of the UWA Students instagram account – occurring on April 5th (PROSH Olympics) and April 13th (PROSH Day).

Due to a massive event the week of PROSH for international dignitaries, we have had to compromise with the City of Perth to allow PROSH to go ahead. PROSH begin able to go ahead in future years is riding on the fact that we keep everyone out of this area, and as such we'll be requiring a greater number of marshals than previously.

Nevin Jayawardena has been selected as Head Marshal, and has begun contact with clubs to establish themes, selling locations, marshals, and registering for PROSH Olympics.

Our event at Subiaco Library on 21st March was a great way to meet some PROSH alumni, and tied into our '85 Years' branding. We also sold some merchandise, and collected donations for old copies of papers.

We have put various roles online with Guild Volunteering to help spread the message of PROSH. This allows students who would like a more structured PROSH experience the opportunity to get involved. For example, we will be pre-arranging 'official' volunteers for shopping centre stalls as well as a team to sell papers in the city over lunch time.

Overview

This month I have been prioritising meeting with tenants to hear their concerns, answer their questions and get their feedback on my ideas, as the role of Tenancy Chair is very much a relationship building exercise. I have also been directing my energy into creating an independent identity for Tenancy, and carving out a space for Tenancy initiatives and projects to be considered important, worthwhile and valued under the current operational structure of the Guild - something that has been lagging over the past couple of years.

Guild Tenancy Executive & Committee | Summary

Tenancy Committee General Meeting and Tenancy Committee Meeting minutes will now be formally accepted by the Executive Management Committee (EMC) and Guild Council, and will appear on the Guild website for accountability and transparency purposes.

Tenancy Capital Expenditure Allocation Proposal | Summary

For background, the Tenancy Committee have been allocated \$100 000 under the Guild Capital budget for the upkeep, maintenance and improvement of Cameron Hall and the top floor of Cameron Hall respectively. Tenant Clubs, Guild Departments and Faculty Societies were notified of the capital expenditure proposal at the Tenancy General Meeting (February 20th 2016) and were asked to submit their top five priorities independently from each other for how both student spaces could be improved. I have compiled a list of tenant suggestions and prioritised the most favoured ones. I will be formulated a proposal to be taken back to tenants at the Tenancy General Meeting (April 23rd 2016) for consultation and approval.

Compilation and Prioritisation of Tenant Suggestions | Summary

- Cameron Hall
 - Maintenance/replacement of storage spaces
 - Repainting walls
 - Recarpeting emergency exit stairwell (or removing carpet and polishing exposed floorboards)
 - Installation of whirly-birds
 - Small air conditioners

- Loft furniture
- Top Floor of the Guild Central Wing
 - Recarpeting hallway and adjoining rooms
 - Repainting walls
 - Magazine holders on walls

Jack and the SOC Committee are working on a separate proposal to be considered and incorporated into the broader Tenancy proposal.

Cameron Hall Storage Space Review & Reallocation | Summary

We are currently reviewing how storage space in Cameron Hall is utilised by tenants, whether it is being underutilised, brainstorming ways in which to maximise its capacity in the future and reallocating storage space. As a consequence of this review and reallocation, Faculty Societies, Clubs and Guild Departments will be given the opportunity to expand their storage space and apply for new storage. The Tenancy Executive will be taking the current usage of the space by storage tenants into strong consideration when conducting the review and reallocation process – please share this information with your networks, there has been confusion amongst some students.

Club Collaborative Zone (CCZ) Storage Allocation | Summary

The allocation of storage space in the Club Collaborative Zone (CCZ) will be conducted through an applications process which will be circulated to the Club and Faculty Society mailing list, as well as Guild Departments. The application process will be conducted in line with the Guild Tenancy Allocation Policy once it has been finalised by the Governance Committee and Guild Council. I will have more information about this at the meeting.

Review of Mailboxes | Summary

The Tenancy Committee have been conducting a yearly review of mailboxes (located on the top floor of the Guild Central Wing) in line with the Guild Mailbox Policy. Mailbox tenants have been notified that a review of mailbox space will be taking place. I will be identifying the mailboxes which aren't currently being utilised, vacating the under-utilised ones and reallocating them on an applications basis.

Work Orders | Summary

- The following work orders have been submitted, received and actioned by Campus Facilities Management relevant Clubs, Faculty Societies and Guild Departments have been notified:
 - UniSFA peeling paint has been rendered, new blind has been installed, and plastic bag has been removed from external vent which was causing ventilation issues.
 - o CH broken lights have been replaced.
 - Cameron Hall Shared Space carpet roll outside Science Union clubroom has been removed, leaky tap on the second floor kitchenette has been fixed, and flickering lights in the Cameron Hall fire escape have been replaced.
 - UWAnime hole in the plasterboard adjacent to clubroom has been sealed.
 - UWASCA/Pantomime internet cables have been linked up and attached to routers, vents have been fixed.
 - Unigames pipelines to thread excess cabling have been created.
 - Women's Department Room cracks in the floor and ground have been recognised but not fixed to date
 - o PROSH faulty door lock has been recognised but not fixed to date.
 - UCFK work order for broken lock submitted (23/3) and keys being re-cut by Guild Finance.
 - Science Union work order for faulty lock and door submitted (23/3).

Guild Tenancy Allocation Policy | Summary

The Tenancy Allocation Policy has been reviewed and amended by the Tenancy Executive to bring it up to date with the current operations of the Guild. The policy has been submitted for review and approval by the Governance Committee and will be tabled for approval at Guild Council.

Guidelines for Locker System in Club Collaborative Zone (CCZ) | Summary

A locker guide has been created to assist students in determining how to hire out a locker from the Club Collaborative Zone (CCZ) and to ensure students are aware and conscious of the process and expectations of locker usage. I have sent a copy of the guidelines to the Guild Student Centre (GSC) who will be administering the use of lockers, and I am in the process of circulating the guidelines to all Clubs, Faculty Societies and Guild Departments. Please note that the purpose of the document is to operate as a guide for students – it is not a binding agreement or policy and thus does not require review or approval by the Governance Committee or Guild Council.

Guild Tenancy Review Survey | Summary

A Guild Tenancy Review Survey has been created and circulated to all tenants. This form will be completed once by each Guild-affiliated Club, Faculty Society and Guild Department who possesses a club room and/or storage space. The form relates to the general tenancy experience of tenants, and will provide us with a better understanding of how tenants are utilising the space, issues which impact tenant usage of facilities, and how the Guild should improve and invest in these spaces in the future.

Leisure Social Club Incident

Leisure have violated their Tenancy Agreement and have been issued a formal warning. I am hoping that from now on, tenants respect their use of Guild spaces as it is a huge privilege to occupy a club room or storage space of campus and many Clubs on campus do not have access to these facilities. As Disciplinary Officers of the Guild, councillors should be on the lookout for inappropriate behaviour around the Guild Village precinct at all times, especially in Cameron Hall.
