Dear Councillors,

Our financial year is nearing an end, and the budgeting process for 2017 has now begun. Myself and Maddie met once with the incoming President and Treasurer to discuss promises and preliminary matters, and will meet again shortly to commence the development of the 2017 budget. If you are a department or council head you should soon receive an email requesting that you meet with your successor and formulate a budget proposal for 2017. Please use the sample spreadsheet attached to create a comprehensive and detailed proposal.

The process for determining the Refectory's future has also begun, and the Catering and Tavern committee will consider this at it's next meeting.

Finance

Overdrafts outstanding:

1. African Students' Union: \$605.36 2. Women in Business UWA: \$700

The African Students' Union overdraft was approved to cover existing debt. This will be repaid slowly over time. It has decreased from \$1000 at the beginning of this year.

The Women in Business overdraft was approved to float the cost of the startup event of this new club. The club did not get the full extent of grants anticipated, so the outstanding amount will need to be repaid gradually through the club's other activities.

In each case, it is likely that myself and the incoming Treasurer will need to work with the club to decide on a repayment plan for 2017.

Catering and Tavern

The Catering and Tavern Committee has met once since my last report.

- Also looking at implementing a Tav membership/loyalty system.

Events | Faith Week

Events | Student Poverty Awareness Campaign

The Student Poverty Awareness Campaign that we ran during Welfare Week this semester was a success! 23 students participated in the stall where they had to guess how many groceries they could buy for the price of a common, compulsory textbook at UWA. This was a great opportunity for us to raise awareness about the Social Justice Collaboration, the detrimental cuts to HEPP and the Guild Student Assist services such as the Food Pantry. One student accompanied me back to the office in order to pop by the pantry and pick up essentials that they required to make them through to their next paycheck in a week.

I am currently collating the online submissions from the #BreakTheBarrier portion of the campaign where we asked students to share their stories, frustrations and insights on student poverty and how it does indeed impact students in a multitude of ways.

Grants | Collaborative and Campus Culture Grants

As per feedback from the final PAC meeting, Ingrid the 2016 PAC Treasurer and I agreed to reopen the submissions for grant money. I have had several club presidents contact me regarding criteria for this grant which is exciting, considering we only received one application for \$250 worth from a pool of \$1000 available to clubs.

Awards | PAC Guild Ball Awards

The award recipients have been finalized and the certificates made. The applications this year were of an incredibly high standard, with a notable increase in attention to detail and presentation from previous years. It is heartwarming to hear about all the amazing initiatives, events and communities our clubs are creating around campus and even more so that they value recognition and commendation from the Guild for their hard work. Sexual Harassment and Assault Policy

On Sunday the 9th of October, the Channel 7 Sunday Night program featured a story on sexual violence at Australian universities. The negative experience of a past UWA student was included in the program. It was also revealed that UWA was one of only two universities to refuse the program's FOI request for its statistics on instances of sexual harassment and assault reported to it.

The program and the FOI refusal elicited much concern from students and the broader community about the way that sexual harassment and assault is being addressed by the university. There was feeling that the lack of transparency signified insufficient institutional handling of sexual violence.

In response, the Women's Department penned an open letter to the university on behalf of the women students of UWA, seeking explanation and statistics from the university. Posted to the Department's Facebook page, the letter has 581 likes, 121 shares and a post reach of 40,446 people at the time of writing this report. Evidently, it is a sentiment that resounded broadly.

On Tuesday the 11th, Maddie and I met with the Vice-Chancellor and Director of Student Life in relation to the Sunday Night Program and the university's FOI refusal. It was explained that UWA did not believe it could release the reporting figures in a meaningful way that would would protect confidentiality and provide a meaningful reflection of student's experiences at UWA-despite the ability of other universities to do so. There was some commitment to change, most pressingly, the establishment of a centralised database so that students can be collected coherently in order to best protect students. In the current process, lack such a database, there is much slippage in the way information is collected, passed on and recorded.

At the meeting, the university invited contribution from the Guild in shaping reformed policy and process for reporting sexual harassment and assault. Having invited student feedback, Maddie, Hannah and I put together a document of recommendations for the university. While this opportunity to shape the university's response to reporting sexual violence is a positive step, it is very frustrating to feel that the Guild was only included to this extent following the negative media attention that UWA received. This is an issue that Women's Officers have been lobbying on since 2014, and that we have spent much energy on in my term. So while it is progress to have major input, it is disheartening for the University to only now be receptive to suggestions we had put forward for months in the lead up the Hunting Ground screening and new online reporting form.

Damsel Magazine Launch

The 2016 Damsel Magazine is rolling off the press.

We've printed 600 copies, the same as the previous year. The magazine will be delivered in the coming days, with an invoice. Printing was agreed at \$1,050+gst.

We will be launching the Magazine on Thursday the 27th of October in Hackett Café, 5-8pm and encourage Council to attend in support of the Department. The launch party will feature live music, complimentary food and drink, and display art from talented local women and non-binary folk.

The printing cost of Damsel magazine, and costs of the launch party will be included in the following month's report.

MCW

MCW was a huge success, with this year's Springfeast attracting over 50 stalls and 5000 Attendees. The MCW team would like to extend their gratitude to members of Guild Council for their help advice and participation in multicultural week.

Overview

At the busy end of Semester 2 WASAC are gearing up for the AGM held next Tuesday. This is a great opportunity for all our members to reflect on what has been an amazing 2016 with WASAC being able to kick many goals in 2016. The 2016 committee has built a foundation for future WASAC committees to continue to build and develop more Indigenous leaders in the UWA community and beyond. Elections begin in straight after the AGM so it will be an exciting to see who is elected in 2017 as there are many nominees. In the last two weeks of the Semester WASAC as planned an end of year windup to reward for their efforts. We will also celebrate the implementation of the Indigenous Graduation Sashes being worn for the first time in UWA history.

Indigenous Graduation Sashes

I am very pride to announce on the 19th of November will be the first ever UWA Graduation Ceremony where Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students will be given the opportunity to wear an Indigenous designed sash representing their culture, community and people. This has been a humbling experience to work with the School of Indigenous Studies and the University in implementing changes to the graduation ceremonies. Adding to inclusion of the sashes, a Welcome to Country will be performed and all students will be receiving Aboriginal designed Message Sticks to take home and keep. I would like to acknowledge all parties involved in delivering this historic milestone in UWA history.

Renaming Marnda Week

It has been 3 years since the first Marnda week was held at UWA however this year will be the last as a renaming process is commencing. The reason behind the renaming is a misinterpretation of the meaning within other Noongar language groups. I can ensure you the new name will continue the momentum of past Marnda weeks and further aim to bring all students and staff to learn about the rich and vibrant Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture we have at UWA.

WASAC Windup

On the last day of Semester the 4th of November WASAC will host their end of year Windup. This event will also be an opportunity for the official announcement of the 2017 WASAC Committee. Students and staff will be able to reflect upon 2016 and celebrate the personal and collective achievements this year.

WASAC AGM

The AGM will be held on Tuesday 25th of October at Shenton House 1pm. There will be a few minor changes to WASAC but the agenda is looking pretty straightforward from here. I will be able to provide more details in the November report to list the approved changes.

Events

Cocktail party – Cocktail party was a big success held at Canton Bar this year. We anticipated a turnout of 70 students and ended up with 93 in ticket sales. This is the premier event of the year for the PSA and attracts a different collection of postgraduates than what we get at other social events. A big thankyou to Canton Bar which was an excellent location, great food, and even produced a specialty PSA cocktail for the evening.

Education issues

Federal Changes to the RTS, APA and IPRS funding – After a decade of lobbying CAPA (Council of Australian Postgraduate Associations) was able to report to me that the changes suggested in the WATT and ACOLA reviews into research training will be implemented on January 1st 2017. These changes allow more flexibility in how universities are able to fund research training. A summary of the changes are outlined:

- Universities will be able to provide an APA between the current levels (at UWA with the top-up that is being phased out that is currently \$29,000 P/A) to ~\$41,000 P/A which will allow for universities to compete for high quality postgraduate students.
- Universities will be able to extend the period that an APA is provided up to 4 years now compared to the current 3-3.5 years (the current PhD time for domestic students at UWA is ~ 4.6 years).
- Universities will now be able to provide part-time scholarships at no penalty allowing more flexibility for some people studying.
- The weighting for funding for Indigenous and Torres Strait Islander student completions is now double for that off domestic students which is expected to encourage more support from universities to getting in these students and supporting them to completion.

We will be working along with the Graduate Research School on their new policy in regards to this funding and hoping that they at least extend funding to 4 years for PhD students (dependent on regular updated reports from students).

Invitation to the council of Australian academic chairs – A very useful and insightful panel. Much of the discussion was on how to engage students in governance and policy discussions and what support and training can be provided to students to ensure that they get the most out of having students on different levels of governance. I advocated strongly for the inclusion of students at the first stages of policy development rather than provide them with an agenda a week in advance and expect a comprehensive student voice on the matter. If a policy idea goes to students early it is not only the student representatives that are able to provide a voice but they are also able to engage with students on matters. It was also suggested that at the beginning of any position on governance

at a university there be a formal and informal welcome for the students as well as a guide on how students can present their own ideas and projects during this time which is often not considered.

Invitation to Deans and Directors of graduate research – This will occur next week at UWA and will focus on international students as well as changes to the funding in research training and scholarships that were mentioned above.

Committee business

Scholarship applications– We received 30 applications for the conference awards and field work/data collection awards. Many were of very high quality and it became difficult to choose the winners this time around and emphasis was placed on students that were self-funding a lot of their travel or data collection. Overall we gave out 3 data collection awards and 8 conference travel awards.

Review of rules and elections regulations – Our rule and regulation changes past through guild council and governance committee and will be voted on at the PSA AGM on October 27th.
