PROJECT UPDATE

Refectory

Fit-outs of outlets are nearing completion, with Utopia already opening. Other outlets are experiencing some delays due to additional approval requirements from the City of Perth. The vendors arriving early this semester are:

We are still negotiating with a potential sixth vendor. Footage has been shot to communicate delays to students.

Freedom of Expression

The report and its recommendations have been accepted by Senate. Thank you all who participated in the thorough consultation process.

StudentConnect Reskin

The launch of this project has been pushed back slightly to do more testing to ensure the integrity of the system.

Student Leader Summit

Venue has been secured, as well as an initial speaker.

Federal Election

As previously reported the Guild undertook several activities for the Federal election. This in included the previous enrol to vote effort, which was a small part of Australia's highest ever voter enrolment, as well as the Get Informed event, where speakers were invited from all major parties. Some Guild Departments also shared info cards to inform students interested in their policy area.

Student App

The development of the 'Involvio' app is in progress, and a student reference group has been established. We are hoping to have this as closely functionally aligned with the Guild website as possible. The launch date is currently envisaged to be before semester 2.

Engagement with Albany

The executive travelled to Albany to meet with representatives, students, and key staff members this month. Being able to connect in person was very profitable. Furthermore, the first club in Albany has been affiliated to SOC. We are continuing to work towards these key initiatives for council to be aware of:

- Discounts
- More contact with OBs to replicate events and initiatives on the Albany Campus where appropriate
- Explore volunteering opportunities in Albany
- Digitise student leadership training for student leaders in Albany
- Work with UWA Sport to provide more sporting opportunities for these students

1st Floor Guild Village Renovation

Planning for the 1st floor of the West Wing of Guild Village is underway. The tender pack has been drafted and is undergoing minor changes before going to tender.

Later this year, STA will move part of their operations downstairs, making room for a new space for Student Assist. Architecture firm Hames Sharley have been commissioned to design the downstairs portion of this, and have started works.

Aston Students' Union

I was fortunate enough to visit the student union at Aston University, in Birmingham, UK to learn about the activities they have to help international students feel at home in Birmingham. A detailed report on this and other insights from Birmingham to follow.

Leeds University Union

I visited Leeds University Union in the UK to learn about their activities and what the Guild might learn from them. Leeds is the leading student union in the UK and has a lot of fantastic activity. A detailed report and recommendations to consider will follow.

Nedlands Cafe

The review of the Nedlands café has progressed. There is a potential cost saving by closing the café during the holidays. This will be discussed at Strategic Resources Committee.

Venue Audit

Ernst Young is conducting an audit of the procedures used to book venues around the university by external parties at the direction of the Audit and Risk committee. The Guild is not a major player in the space; however I have completed an interview and outlined the process to the auditors.

Young Leaders Council

Congratulations to Raaghav Raj and the YLC team on running the first Young Leaders Council. It was very successful event, attracting approximately 50 students who were very satisfied with their experience. Planning for the next event in July is underway.

New Cafe

Planning for the new 'café on the corner' has commenced at a very early stage. This will form the basis of the design and direction of the café. Guild Council will be updated and have input very soon.

Convocation Clubs

Convocation is investigating setting up clubs that graduates of the university could join. This proposal has a lot of potential and would provide clubs with the opportunity to better engage with interested alumni, and would also give club members a way to be involved after they finish university. There is a lot more work to be done before such a system is integrated, and I encourage input and feedback.

PROJECT UPDATE

Accessibility on Campus

Continue to work to get better communications from campus management to students with regards to social sciences lift being out of order. Have requested updates on Social Sciences lift, very little information forthcoming. Lift still has old signs on it.

Mike will be sitting on the Tenancy Elevator Subcommittee as a representative of the Access Department.

Access Room

While there were some delays in getting the room in working order, the room is now open and available for student usage. We will look to continue improving the room over the break and hold a room warming in early semester 2. Materials have been sourced through numerous organisations and are available from outside the Access Room. We also have other materials yet to be sorted that are available upon request.

Special Consideration

Have been getting feedback from students about special consideration. We have been addressing students' concerns and working to gather information for students facing trouble with their special consideration applications or just being unsure about the processes or outcomes. We've been talking with Student Assist about these cases and referring students on to them as appropriate. We have reached out to UniAccess and the FABLE office for clarification of specific policies and relayed these to students.

We have made sure to ensure students are anonymised while we seek information to support them. Our community has also been very supportive of their fellow members in seeking support, through giving their own experiences and helping find solutions. We may consider reaching out to the university about some issues found with certain aspects of special consideration.

Student Carer's Collective

We have been approached by two student, Sabrina Ipsaro-Passione and Claire Cox, about addressing the needs of student carers on campus. We discussed how this might look and came to a mutual agreement that a Carer's Collective may be the best way forward. The collective will operate under the Access Department and work towards supporting Student Carers and provide them with community support and advice, as well as running events catered towards them.

Sabrina and Claire are interested in taking the helm for this project and being our Carer's Collective Co-Convenors. They are currently working on an outline and we will be attending a meeting with Carers WA alongside them. Our hope is to run the collective during Semester 2 and track its progress, with the goal of incorporating them under our department rules in our Semester 2 OGM.

Sabrina and Claire have already been working hard to support student carers and bringing their concerns and issues that matter to them to our attention. We have every confidence they will be excellent leaders of the Collective and in support Student Carers.

PROJECT UPDATE

Collaborative Reference Group

There were no Collaborative Reference Group meeting held this Wednesday as there are currently no notable points of discussion for the clubs and FacSocs. I have sent an email to update them about the finalisation of the grant terms, and plan to hold a "how-to write a grant application" workshop at the beginning of next semester.

Governance Update

I have begun updating the Discipline Policy and working on ways to introduce restorative justice into the Guild's disciplinary processes. This has proven to be quite challenging, and will require a good amount of workshopping with the Governance Committee. The election of new committee members, Esther Nixon, Levon Johnson, and Katrina Revy, will also speed up the review process of the Tenancy Policies, as well as the creation of the Alumni Development Terms of Reference.

Guild General Regulations

The University's Senior Legislative Officer has received and reviewed the comments and changes we wanted made to the Statute as well as the General Regulations. She was happy with almost all changes, and was namely in favour of major changes, namely formalising Sports and Ethnocultural as Guild Departments, and including "not-for-profit" in the description of the Guild. We hope to receive a draft with

the new changes from her in a couple months' time, with the regulations hopefully being finalised at the end of this year.

Election Culture Working Group

The Election Culture Working Group has not met this month as we await the results of the Election Culture Survey. Thanks to the working group for candid and constructive discussions about how to reform elections, and thanks to Ben for creating the survey and working with marketing to populate it. If you have not filled out the survey, please do so.

Sustainable Clubs Guide

Have worked on the guide with two committee members for the past two and a half weeks. Draft is almost complete! Text content should be finalised by the end of semester and will be passed on to Guild Creative, in due course, for graphic design for the final published copy.

Friends of the Grounds Campus Biodiversity App

This project is very much progressing with Coders for Causes already starting to code for the main skeleton of the application. We suspect the mobile app development will make most of its progress during the winter break when the volunteer coders have maximum free time. The app will include a map denoting all the Australian native plants on campus, including its history and particularly information about the birds that inhabit these spaces.

UCapture

Have partenered with UCapture, a green-tech platform that funds carbon offsetting projects, to set up the UWA UCapture Program. Will continue to discuss initiatives to engage students with the program with Avery Michaelson, founder and CEO of UCapture, and my committee.

UWA Alumni Profile + Career Cafe

Have just completed my profile with UWA Alumni. It will be published in their June newsletter edition. I will be conducting interviews with past alumni currently working in sustainability in the coming weeks. We have

also been doing some early planning for our Sustainability Career Café happening next semester, which will be held at the Oceans Institute (date TBC).

• Developing clubs on campus – Succession Planning:

- UTS sporting clubs are run by the student union, alongside regular clubs. UTS also have a tier system for clubs based on performance, with higher tiers indicating elite athleticism level. Additionally, UTS students are given the cheapest rate of access to sporting programs.
- USYD indicate that community members heavily influence their sporting clubs, whilst maintaining a 50% student requirement. A minimum of 10 students is required to start a club for internal creations. For external affiliations, they require X amount of students, must attend open day/O-DAY, must submit financials etc.
- Swinburne indicate that sporting club committee members must be students, alongside the 50% student requirement. A great initiative they run is where <u>new committees roll in before the outgoing committee</u> leaves, in which they have a period of over-lap which enables a better handover.
- Curtin indicates that they meet up with clubs on a regular basis in order to gauge how they are progressing/resolve issues. Curtin also indicate that <u>club constitutions</u>, <u>continuation resources and records are documented in a centralised database</u>.
- UniSA indicates that they hire external people for their experience. However, unpaid volunteers do not manage the paid external hires well.

• Developing clubs on campus – International Students:

- RMIT indicates that internationals tend to flock to Outdoor clubs. In general, they face challenges in engaging international students due to their tendency to prefer social rather than competitive sports, their longevity (internationals do not hang around long enough) and language barriers.
- UTS provides different level opportunities in order to cater for internationals.
- ANU enables international cultural clubs (e.g. Pakistani Society, DESI) to compete against each other in social fixtures.
- UniSA runs drop-in sessions to identify and retain international talent.

• Developing clubs on campus - Structure of Clubs:

- UTS indicate that staff door-knock on athletes rooms whilst at nationals in order to ensure compliance with regulations.
- USYD nationals managers have a contractual checklist detailing criteria to satisfy in order to be reimbursed for their trip/accommodation. For each criteria not met, they are deducted money from their reimbursement.

• Developing clubs on campus – Student Engagement:

- Incentivise executive committee performance through transcript recognition and/or credit points.
- Strong constitutions enable non-performers to be removed from club committees.
- Reporting harassment: flowcharts are efficient.

- Gala Dinner: Networked with heads of sport at Deakin University and Victoria University of Wellington.
- Benefits of sport on student wellness: Delivered by Chris Massey (UWA Director of Student Life).
 - Enable student wellbeing.
 - <u>Collaborate</u> in research objectives.
 - <u>Lead</u> in student experience strategy.
 - Instigate partnerships for UWA.

• The evolution of eSports on campus:

- Delivered by Martin Doulton (Monash Sport GM).
- Explained Monash's partnership with League of Legends publisher Riot Games and the establishment of their eSports Hub, alongside their development of eSports integration into university life.
- China eSports Market (\$3bn by 2020)
 - o 100 eSport Leagues
 - o 3 eSports cities
 - o 250,000 eSports employees
- Recognised eSports in Monash varsity sport program.
- Provided eSports athletes with access to elite athlete program.
